

Summary Paragraph

Brigham City is geographically located in the southeastern part of Box Elder County, approximately 60 miles north and west of Salt Lake City, Utah on the western slopes of the Wellsville Mountains, at the western terminus of Box Elder Canyon. The *Brigham City Historic District* is the historic core of Brigham City and encompasses the central commercial district and early residential neighborhoods. The *Brigham City Historic District* is bounded by 500 East Street (from 700 West to Box Elder Creek); 700 South Street; 300 West Street (from 700 South to 300 South); 400 West (from 300 South to 200 South; 500 West (from 200 South to Forest Street); 800 West (surrounding Forest Street); 500 West (from Forest Street to 300 North); 300 West (from 300 North to 500 North); and 500 North Street (from 300 West to 100 East). The district boundary is the historic core of Brigham City, encompassing areas within the original town plats with density of construction dates prior to 1950.

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The architecture of the district has very good historical integrity and clearly displays the various contextual periods of local development established in this nomination: “Reinforcement, Brigham City Cooperative Society, and Founding of Brigham City” (1855-1896); “Utah Sugar Company, Community Development and Prosperity” (1897-1920); “Agricultural Decline, Specialization and Bushnell General Hospital” (1921-1946); and “Intermountain Indian School and Thiokol” (1947-1974). The early development of Brigham City was greatly influenced by its original founding under the direction of Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints’ fifth President, Lorenzo Snow as well as the transcontinental railroad which exited Weber Canyon a few miles south of Brigham City and turned northwest toward Promontory, Utah where the two railroads were joined in 1869. Brigham City enjoyed significant periods of prosperity beginning in 1855 and extending through 1974, and its architectural inventory reflects local and national building trends. Eighty-four percent of its contributing resources are single-family dwellings, seven percent are commercial buildings, five percent are multiple dwellings, two percent are religious buildings, one percent (each) are agricultural and government/social buildings. Contributing resources were constructed between 1855 and 1974. The *Brigham City Historic District* includes 1,813 primary resources, of which 1,106 (61 percent) retain their historical integrity. Considering the number of contributing resources and that the district encompasses the majority of the historical city, overall, the district retains very good historical integrity in all aspects of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. The remaining 707 resources are considered non-contributing resources—historical resources that have been substantially altered or out-of-period resources. Twenty-four (24) of the contributing buildings were previously individually listed on the National Register of Historic Places (see table below). The contributing resources reflect a broad range of architectural types and styles from 19th Century Revival to Modern.

Narrative Description

Physical Environment

The Brigham City Historic District boundary encompasses the historic core of Brigham City, Box Elder County, Utah, which is geographically located in the southeastern part of Box Elder County, approximately 60 miles north and west of Salt Lake City, Utah. Brigham City sits at 4,315 feet in elevation on the western slopes of the Wellsville Mountains, a branch of the Wasatch Range, at the western terminus of Box Elder Canyon. The town was originally founded along the Box Elder Creek, which extends from Box Elder Canyon and flows northwest through Brigham City toward the Great Salt Lake. To the west is a large, flat region of desert scrub of the Great Basin, eventually giving way to marshlands on the edge of the Great Salt Lake. To the north is the Bear River Valley, which is a rich sedimentary farming area composed of sediments deposited by the Bear River which traverses from north to south through the Bear River Valley before emptying into the marshlands and managed water basins of the Bear River National Migratory Bird Refuge, which is located to the west of Brigham City.

Brigham City’s population was 19,650 when the census was taken in 2020, growing from 17,899 in 2010. The population of surrounding Box Elder County was 57,666 people in the 2020 U.S.

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Census, and its county seat is Brigham City. The city's area is 24.92 square miles.¹ U.S. Interstate 15 and Interstate 84 pass to the west of the city center. U.S. Highway 89 approaches Brigham City from the south and U.S. Highway 91 approaches from Interstates 15/84 west of Brigham City and both highways intersect in Brigham City along Main Street then climb through Box Elder Canyon together toward Cache Valley.

Boundary Description of the *Brigham City Historic District*

The boundaries of the *Brigham City Historic District* are approximately the general extent of 19th century residential and pre-1950 commercial and residential construction density within the original three plats of Brigham City. The south boundary extends along 700 South from 300 West to 500 East, including both sides of those streets, as well as the original gates of Bushnell General Hospital on the south side of 700 South. The east boundary extends from 700 South just behind 500 East to 500 South, then extends eastward to 600 East to encompass the Brigham City Cemetery boundary between 500 South and 300 South, then continues behind 500 East to 100 North. At 100 North, the boundary follows Box Elder Creek and Box Elder Canal northeasterly to 400 North and 100 East. Specifically, the boundary moves northwesterly between 500 East and 400 East between 200 and 300 North; then west along 200 North to 300 East; then north to 300 North; then west again just behind 300 North to 100 East; then north to 500 North. The northern boundary extends west from 100 East to 300 West just behind 500 North. The western boundary extends south from 500 North just behind 300 West, to 300 North; then west to 500 West along both sides of 300 North Street; then south just behind 500 West to Forest Street; then west including both sides of Forest Street to 850 West; then south along 500 West to 200 South; east including both sides of 200 South to 400 West; then south to 300 South including both sides of 400 West; then east along 300 South to 300 West; then south just behind 300 West to 700 South. See Figure 1 and Map 1 for construction dates, Brigham City Plats and district boundary.

The district is the historic core of Brigham City's earliest and original plats (A,B,C). The district boundaries include all of the somewhat unique development pattern of Brigham City, where residential infill took place over decades within those plats. A smaller boundary would exclude elements of that development pattern. Also, the mix of contributing to non-contributing properties is fairly evenly interspersed throughout the city (see maps 5 and 6), so there is not a base core that would warrant a tighter boundary. There are many other later residential developments outside of and surrounding the district within Brigham City which reflect residential growth of the city up to the present. All of these developments are platted subdivisions, mostly located to the southwest and also to the north and northeast. To the west of the district is open land and industrial development.

Methodology and Eligibility Requirements

The methodology used to evaluate of resources for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility was based on the results of two Reconnaissance Level Surveys (RLS) of Brigham City completed in 2021 and 2022.²

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Each resource was evaluated for eligibility based on Utah State Historic Preservation Office's (USHPO) Reconnaissance Level Survey (RLS) Guidelines, revised in 2022 and National Park Service Bulletin 15 *How to Apply the National Register Criteria for Evaluation* (NPS 1997). In Utah, all architectural resources documented at the reconnaissance level are evaluated using a rating system established by the Historic Buildings program at UDSH. This rating system allows for the assignment of one of four ratings to buildings and structures based on the degree to which they retain historical and architectural integrity. Integrity includes the NRHP-defined qualities including location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association. The UDSH designations are as follows:

EC — Eligible-Contributing: built within the historic period and retains integrity; good example of type or style; eligible for National Register as part of a potential historic district or primarily for historical, rather than architectural reasons. [Additions do not detract and alterations may be reversible].

NC — Non-Contributing/Ineligible: built during the historic period but has had major alterations or additions; no longer retains integrity. [Resource may have important local significance].

OP — Out-of-period: constructed outside the historic period, in this case after 1974.

The most common alteration to the residences within the district was the replacement/covering of wood siding with aluminum or vinyl siding. Other common alterations included new windows and doors. These changes were assessed for both individual and cumulative effects. In general, modifications to historic resources were considered acceptable if the changes did not significantly compromise or diminish the qualities that characterize the building or district. For example, aluminum siding that mimicked wider clapboards was common in the 1950s and '60s and was considered a common alteration from during the period of significance. Buildings with this type of siding were evaluated as contributing (depending on other alterations made, if any). However, vinyl siding and narrow clapboard aluminum siding are more recent alterations, typically out of the period of significance. For properties re-sided in the later materials were considered non-contributing (also depending on the amount of the building covered and taking into consideration other alterations).

The *Brigham City Historic District* includes 1813 primary resources, of which 1106 (61 percent) are contributing. Of the 707 (39 percent) non-contributing resources, 521 are altered historic resources and 186 were constructed after the historic period of significance. Eighty-four (84) percent (933) of the contributing resources are single-family dwellings and 7 percent (79) are commercial buildings. Other contributing resources include 53 multiple dwellings, 18 religious buildings, 16 civic/government buildings, 6 agricultural buildings and 1 rail transportation-related building. There are four contributing structures: one granary, one bridge, one sign and the Bushnell General Hospital gates. There are two contributing sites including the Brigham City Cemetery and Rees Pioneer Park. Although outbuildings are not included in the primary resource

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count for the historic district, the RLS noted 359 outbuildings, primarily garages, of which 224 (62 percent) are contributing and 135 (38 percent) are non-contributing. The resources of the *Brigham City Historic District* are spread throughout its period of significance, with 127 Mid-19th Century resources, 104 Late Victorian/Victorian Revivals, 399 Late 19th and 20th Century American Movements examples, 156 Late 19th and 20 Century Revivals, 24 early Modern Movements and 670 World War II/Post-War Modern examples. The district includes 24 properties previously listed on the National Register of Historic Places (see table below), most of which were listed based on the Historic Resources of Brigham City, Utah Multiple Property Submission (NRIS #64500658).³

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Streetscapes and Landscape Features of the *Brigham City Historic District*

After his appointment as the settlement's ecclesiastic and civic leader in the fall of 1853, Lorenzo Snow, with his family, arrived in then named Box Elder in the spring of 1854 and began to immediately transform the small primitive settlement into his vision of a civilized city. Lorenzo Snow directed a resurvey of the original townsite and re-situated it on level ground near Box Elder Creek where a network of canals and ditches were created to provide water from Box Elder Creek. Lorenzo Snow soon renamed the settlement to Brigham City, in honor of LDS Church President Brigham Young.⁴ The original three plats of Brigham City mirror those of Salt Lake City's early town and big field plats which were designed by Brigham Young following the general principles of LDS Church founder Joseph Smith's original "Plat of the City of Zion."⁵ Brigham City's design includes: a symmetrical gridiron street pattern aligned in cardinal directions, a central townsite with low-density half-acre lots for houses, surrounding larger (1 and 1.23 acre) lots for barns and corrals, two larger blocks in the town center specifically for civic and religious buildings, adjoining central blocks for civic and religious buildings and uniform 25' setbacks for houses.

Although Brigham City's design closely follows Brigham Young's, Oberlin College-educated Lorenzo Snow altered the design to encompass two unusual elements: A neoclassical urban center plan which appears to be based on William Penn's 1683 grid design of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania as well as rectangular not square blocks with moderate street widths. In 1856, Lorenzo Snow directed the construction of the Box Elder County court house [Photograph 1], which was a multi-purpose building serving as the government offices, an auditorium for church services and public meetings and as a theater. Completed in 1857, the courthouse still forms the rear main section of the current Box Elder County building.⁶ Lorenzo Snow chose the exact center of the settlement to erect the building, directly facing Forest Street, the central east-west boulevard connecting the 1906 Oregon Short Line (OSL) Railroad Station (NRIS #92000891) [Photograph 2] and downtown, a road which he expanded in width. The courthouse blocks Forest Street at Main Street, disrupting the uniform grid pattern typically envisioned in the Plat of Zion. Brigham City also has rectangular blocks with moderate street widths, which also bear a closer resemblance to the Philadelphia plan than the 660-foot square blocks and 132-foot-wide streets typically found in Utah cities and towns. Brigham City's blocks are 6 acres, smaller than the 10-acre blocks found in Salt Lake City's early plats. Town lots were initially 165 feet deep by 132 feet wide 1/2-acre lots with blocks containing 5 or 6 lots in length and 2 lots deep. Streets running north and south were initially 99 feet wide and those running east and west were 66 feet wide. Those initial design widths have been reduced by the addition of wide park strips and sidewalks to a uniform 60-foot paved street width, except for Forest Street, which is 132 feet wide west of the courthouse. 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Brigham City's current streetscapes have been strongly influenced by residential infill during early periods of growth, most prior to automobile transportation. Although initial lots were 132 feet wide, almost every lot has been subdivided, leaving the earliest residences located on street corners and alternating mid-19th Century, late Victorian and Late 19th and 20th Century American Movements residences interspersed within each block. [Photographs 3 and 4] The original low-density 132-foot lot-width design has been transformed by infill into an approximate 66-foot lot widths, creating a feeling of density within the city. [Photographs 5 and 6]

The streets are single-lane in each direction with curb and gutters. All residential blocks have sidewalks, uniform, deep park-strips with trees and an approximately 25-foot set-back for houses. Main Street between 700 South and 700 North, with the exception of the central business district, has almost 100-year-old London Plane trees planted in its park-strips, creating a beautiful, uniform canopy over the main thoroughfare. The LDS Tabernacle [Photograph 29], constructed in 1876, has large London Plane trees, probably contemporary with the original construction of the building, along its perimeter park strips. Most of the garages are further set-back than the residences, and other secondary buildings are often located behind the residences. [Photograph 7]

Brigham City Historic District Character Defining Features

There are several historic features of the district that give the district its unique character. These features are:

- **Plat of Zion Layout:** Brigham City has one of the clearest presentations of the “Plat of the City of Zion” layout with a square central “city” plat section and north and south “big field” lots. However, Brigham City varies from the Salt Lake City design template with rectangular blocks, moderate streets and the courthouse as its central building rather than the more common religious building.
- **Uniform street widths and set-backs.** Brigham City has an almost uniform 60-foot street width, although the park strips vary according to the earliest street designs. Exceptions are made for the two large streets bisecting Brigham City from the east to west: Forest Street and 200 West. Houses are set-back 25’ from the sidewalk, creating a uniform façade pattern within the residential town plats as well as later developed “big field” lots surrounding the originally platted townsite.
- **Classical architecture prior to 1869 and Late Victorian Eclectic architecture after the arrival of the railroad in 1869.** Brigham City has a very well preserved and highly varied selection of both vernacular classical Utah residential architecture and Late Victorian architecture, reflecting the economic prosperity of Brigham City during its cooperative period between 1864-1879 as well as its connection between northern railroads and the transcontinental railroad between 1871 and the completion of the Lucin Cutoff in 1904,

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- **Residential Infill Patterns and Building Types.** Brigham City began with large 1/2 acre lots, in keeping with the “City of the Plat of Zion” layout, but with its manufacturing economy and growth periods primarily coming before the advent of large-scale automobile travel, the city generally subdivided each lot into two, creating a denser, more walkable residential design pattern than most early Utah towns. The infill is also a defining element in Brigham City and residential designs from each of the periods of early prosperity can be found next to one another as the city developed, with the oldest classical residences on the corner of the inner town lots, Late Victorian styles often present on block corners and bungalows interspersed between those early buildings. [Photographs 3, 4, and 5] Toward the edges of town, the infill becomes World War II/Minimal Traditional style as the Bushnell General Hospital created a last large boom within the traditional residential section of Brigham City.

Materials

Brick is the predominant material found in Brigham City, Utah, with forty-eight percent (865 of 1813) having a brick exterior. Next comes wood clapboard siding, which was the primary material for many of the more modest early Brigham City buildings. Much of this has been covered with aluminum siding, asphalt or asbestos siding, often in the historic period. Twenty-four (24) percent (444 of 1813) of all buildings in the district are presently covered by wood, aluminum, asphalt or asbestos siding. Vinyl siding is the next most common material, with twelve percent of the buildings sided with this modern material. There are also 150 (8 percent) examples of historic stucco buildings; fifty-eight (58) early concrete block/rock-faced stone buildings; and three (3) adobe brick buildings within the district. [Photographs 9, 11, 12, 15, 20, 33, 42]

Architectural Types and Styles by Contextual Periods

For the purpose of this district nomination, the history of Brigham City during the period of significance is discussed in terms of four major development periods: **Reinforcement, Brigham City Cooperative Society, and Founding of Brigham City (1855-1896), Utah Sugar Company, Community Development and Prosperity (1897-1920), Agricultural Decline, Specialization and Bushnell General Hospital (1921-1946), and Intermountain Indian School and Thiokol (1947-1974)**. The architectural types and styles reflected in the district are representative of broader local and national architectural trends as they changed over time. These trends, as represented by the existing building stock in the district, are discussed below within the context of each of the four major development periods.

Reinforcement, Brigham City Cooperative Society, and Founding of Brigham City (1855-1896)

The early building stock of the *Brigham City Historic District* reflects the development of Brigham City after its founding in 1851 and reinforcement in 1854 by 50 primarily Welsh and

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Danish immigrant families from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints under the supervision of Apostle Lorenzo Snow. In 1864, after the initial phase of settlement was completed, Brigham Young sought to bring LDS Church founder Joseph Smith's vision of an economic and religious utopia called Zion through the United Order Movement. Brigham City, under the continuing direction of Lorenzo Snow, implemented a cooperative version of the movement. Historian Leonard Arrington tells of the inception of the Brigham City cooperative: "With a city of almost 1,600 inhabitants to provide for, Apostle Snow supervised the organization in 1864 of a cooperative general store. It was his intention to use this mercantile cooperative as the basis for the organization of the entire economic life of the community and the development of the industries needed to make the community self-sufficient."⁷ Rather than a communal organization, Brigham City was a joint-stock enterprise, and within two years had begun its first manufacturing venture, a large-scale tannery. In 1870, the Brigham City Mercantile and Manufacturing Association was formally incorporated.⁸ At its zenith in 1877, the cooperative had forty departments including a woolen mill, flouring mill, cabinet mill, three sawmills, a lime kiln, extensive sheep and cattle herds located in far-flung grazing lands, a dairy, cotton-growing acreage 350 miles south, among several other enterprises. The cooperative also issued its own currency, employed all male residents as well as itinerant laborers and supported all its residents including widows and orphans.⁹ Almost simultaneously, the Railroad Act of 1862 placed U.S. Government support behind a transcontinental railroad, helped to create the Union Pacific Railroad company and identified the route just south of Brigham City, Utah through Weber Canyon and around the northern end of the Great Salt Lake, just a few miles west of Brigham City.¹⁰ That route guaranteed that railroad construction and increased communication after the completion of the railroad would upend the insular social and economic lives of both the residents of Brigham City and more generally Utah. As construction progressed through Utah in 1868 and 1869, Brigham City and Ogden were the closest cities to the routes and grew to support the thousands of railroad workers who constructed roads, rails and bridges. A second rail project, with a much larger and sustained impact on Brigham City was the Utah Northern Railroad, an extension of the Utah Central Railroad which had been constructed between Ogden and Salt Lake City by the LDS Church to meet the Transcontinental Railroad in 1869. Rail lines eventually extended to Cache Valley northeast of Brigham City as well as north to the important Montana mining district, a rail line which later became the Oregon Short Line railroad. The railroad facilitated the almost doubling of Brigham City's population from 1,877 in 1870 to 2,859 in 1900.

There are 130 contributing and 109 non-contributing buildings dating to this period present in the *Brigham City Historic District*. The Brigham City cemetery site and LDS Relief Society Granary structure at 408 East 100 North (NRIS #89000455) [Photograph 10] were also completed during this period.

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Residential Architecture

Most the remaining resources from this period are residential, including 123 contributing and 109 non-contributing single-family residences. With the early founding of Brigham City by the Church of Latter-day Saints, its early residential architecture strongly reflects Utah early classical designs, including the Hall-Parlor and Central Passage form. Brigham City has 72 extant Hall-Parlor and 16 Central Passage houses dating from this period. The best preserved of the three earliest remaining examples of the Hall-Parlor form, all constructed in 1868 is located at 204 South 200 West [photograph 11]. Many of the earliest houses have had alterations and the addition of modern siding, like the non-contributing 1868 Hall-Parlor residence located at 95 North 500 West [Photograph 12]. Early Hall-Parlor residences, like much of Utah's early architecture reflect classical or picturesque styles. Later Hall-Parlor residences often reflected national Late Victorian trends, although often in smaller details such as the 1895 Hall-Parlor located at 121 North 100 East with arched window lintels and decorative scrollwork in the window headers [Photograph 13] and the Victorian porch and steep roof pitch example located at 343 North 200 West. [Photograph 14] The Central Passage house was also popular in Brigham City during this contextual period. The Christian Hansen residence, located at 13 North 200 East, is a Central Passage that was remodeled with a Spanish Colonial exterior [Photograph 15]. One of the best-preserved classical style Central Passage examples, the 1857 Peter Forsgren Residence located at 59 South 100 East (NRIS #02001737) [Photograph 16] and one of the latest Central Passage residences, with Late Victorian styling is the 1895 Thomas Blackburn House located at 58 South 300 West [Photograph 17]. Although not many remain, there are examples of the earliest type Utah residences, the Double Cell and Double Pile houses, including the 1888 Double Cell residence located at 94 North 100 East [Photograph 18] and the 1885 Double Pile residence located at 25 West 300 South [Photograph 19]. Four altered examples of single cell type residences are also extant in the district, none of which are contributing. An early single cell, circa 1855, is the Knudson Cabin which was moved in 1929 and again in 2000 [Photograph 20].

After the arrival of the transcontinental railroad in 1869, both Utah and particularly Brigham City began constructing cross wing or gabled "L" houses and later side-passage and central-block-with-projecting-bays irregular Victorian forms, according to *Utah's Historic Architecture, 1847-1940*.¹¹ In Brigham City, many of the earliest Hall-Parlor and Central Passage forms were altered with additional wings to make the updated Cross Wing forms. Examples are the Second Empire Cross Wing located at 177 North 100 East [Photograph 21] and the 1888 Center Cross Wing located at 236 North 200 East [Photograph 22]. Continuing with national trends, larger and more ornate Late Victorian styles became prevalent, including the Central-Block-with-Projecting Bays residences, with eleven residences constructed primarily in the last few years of this contextual period. The 1893 Nels Jensen House located at 136 East 100 South (NRIS

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#00001588) [Photograph 23] and the 1893 residence at 147 South 100 East [Photograph 24] are well-preserved examples. Side-Passage Victorian forms were also constructed throughout the early contextual period of Brigham City, with seven examples found within the district. The 1883 Side-Passage Faulkner-Peterson residence located at 177 South 100 East [Photograph 25] has the more modest footprint common to early residences. Another early 1870 example is located at 420 South Main Street [Photograph 26].

Commercial Architecture

The only extant building directly related to the Brigham City Cooperative Society is the 1891 Brigham City Co-op Mercantile Building located at 11 North Main Street which is an example of Victorian Romanesque stone and brick commercial architecture [Photograph 47]. There are two additional commercial buildings constructed during this contextual period, the 1892 Armeda Block/Idle Isle Café located at 24 South Main Street [Photograph 27] and the 1891 Horsley Building located at 133 South Main Street [Photograph 28].

Civic/Religious Architecture

Six extant contributing Brigham City civic/religious buildings were constructed during the “Reinforcement, Brigham City Cooperative Society, and Founding of Brigham City” contextual period. The only civic building constructed in this period is the 1857 Box Elder County Courthouse, 1 North Main Street. (NRIS #88000399) [Photograph 1]. The LDS Relief Society Granary located at 408 East 100 North was also constructed in 1892 (NRIS #89000455) [Photograph 10]. The most important religious building in early Brigham City was the 1876 Box Elder Stake Tabernacle which was constructed at 251 South Main Street, in line with the practice of early LDS settlements separating the commercial and spiritual districts in town, although Brigham City, unusually for early Utah town designs, placed the tabernacle away from the town center (NRIS #71000840) [Photograph 29]. Brigham City was originally separated into four separate “wards” or individual congregations within the Box Elder Stake.¹² The stone Temple Form Brigham City First Ward building, constructed in 1884, located at 311 South 100 East is an excellent early religious building [Photograph 30]. The other example of religious architecture is the Brigham City Presbyterian Church building located at 305 South 100 East, which was moved to the same lot as the Brigham City First Ward Building, converted to a Masonic Hall and covered in brick circa 1954 [Photograph 31].

Cemetery

The Brigham City Cemetery [Photographs 108-111] dates back to 1853, when Mary Ellen Wright, who was an infant, was the first person interred here. However, the cemetery was not completely surveyed and platted until 1886. The next year, in 1887, sextons were appointed by the city council.

It was not until after World War I that a broader improvement of the cemetery was commenced. This included mapping out existing roads, improving the landscape, lining up headstones and installing a sprinkler system. The Works Progress Administration (WPA) was responsible for completing much of the work. The City then took over the care and maintenance of the cemetery.

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Of notable interment in the Brigham City Cemetery is Lorenzo Snow, who was directed by Brigham Young to lead a group of families to settle Brigham City. Snow later served as president of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. There are also mass burials of those who died from cholera while working on the Transcontinental Railroad line. Also of note are architectural headstones and monuments that date to the cemetery's beginnings.

Utah Sugar Company, Community Development and Prosperity (1897-1920)

With continuing railroad traffic and manufacturing businesses created by the Brigham City Mercantile and Manufacturing Association, Brigham City continued to prosper, creating many of its commercial and residential buildings during this contextual period. Another development that substantially changed the future of Brigham City was the organization of the Utah Sugar Company in 1891 and the establishment of the Utah Sugar Company sugar beet processing plant at Garland, Utah just north of Tremonton, Box Elder County, Utah in 1901. The Utah Sugar Company purchased and operated the Bear River Water Company and extended canals through the Bear River Valley to Brigham City, increasing the amount and reliability of water supplies to Brigham City and surrounding farms.¹³ Farms around Brigham produced enough sugar beets to justify the construction of a second beet processing plant in Brigham City which opened in 1916. The factory initially processed 500 tons of beets, which increased to 900 tons by the early 1920s. That agricultural success overcame the opening of the Lucin Cutoff in 1904 which directed railroad traffic away from Brigham City and reduced rail traffic from three trains a week to only one.¹⁴

There are 234 contributing and 192 non-contributing buildings for a total of 427 total resources extant from the *Brigham City Historic District's* "Utah Sugar Company, Community Development and Prosperity" contextual period. Ninety-one percent of the buildings (389) are single family residences and the remaining 38 are commercial, civic, agricultural, or religious buildings.

Residential Architecture

In keeping with larger Utah building patterns, Brigham City continued to construct both early and late Mid-19th Century Revival and Victorian residences in the last decade of the 19th Century and first decade of the 20th Century. There are 24 extant classical building types, including one single and one double cell; eighteen (18) Hall-Parlors and four (4) Central Passages. Many of these later classical residences exhibit Victorian styling, including the Central Passage Jonathan & Jennie Knudson residence located at 48 South 100 East (NRIS #00001583) [Photograph 32] or the Central Passage, located at 132 South 200 East, [Photograph 33], one of several examples of rock-face concrete block used in residential construction during this

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contextual period. Many of Brigham City's Hall-Parlor residences were modest and clad in wood siding, which have often had modern siding and window replacements. An example is the Hall-Parlor located at 324 East 200 North [Photograph 34]. Cross Wings were also being constructed after 1900, with 34 extant examples. The stucco double Cross Wing located at 411 South Main Street exhibits Victorian styling in that more traditional building type [Photograph 35].

As Brigham City continued to enjoy economic success from both local industry and the railroad toward the beginning of the 20th century, larger and later Victorian forms such as the Central-Block-with-Projecting-Bays, Rectangular Block and Side Passage/Entry residences were commonly constructed. There are 82 examples of this residential type constructed between 1898 and 1920, including 62 Central-Block-with-Projecting-Bays, 17 Rectangular Block and 3 Side Passage/Entry residences. Exterior styles in these residences varied from Late Victorian Eclectic like the 1904 William and Nettie Glover Residence located at 106 West 100 North (NRIS #00001587) [Photograph 36], to Neo-Classical examples like the 1911 Central-Block-with-Projecting-Bays residence located at 541 South 100 West [Photograph 37] and the 1910 Rectangular Block residence located at 178 North 300 West [Photograph 38], to examples with American Movements exteriors including Bungalow and Arts & Crafts exterior styling found on the 1905 residence located at 95 North 100 West [Photograph 39] and the 1918 residence located at 24 North 100 East [Photograph 40].

After 1908, following national and regional trends, Brigham City began constructing American Movements Bungalows, Box Bungalows and Foursquare (Box) type residences, primarily with Bungalow and Arts & Crafts styling, but with a few Prairie School examples. There are 208 extant examples of these forms found in the *Brigham City Historic District* which were constructed during this contextual period, including 159 Bungalows, 44 Box Bungalows and 5 Foursquare (Box) residences. Simpler residences such as the 1915 Box Bungalow located at 54 South 200 East [Photograph 41] were often clad in wood siding and have often lost integrity after having their exteriors covered with later aluminum or vinyl siding. An example of both a Foursquare (Box) form and Prairie School style is the 1919 residence located at 161 North 200 West [Photograph 42]. Bungalow forms usually exhibited traditional Bungalow or Arts and Crafts styling, such as the transitional Bungalow, constructed in 1900, located at 69 South 100 West [Photograph 43] or the 1919 Bungalow located at 27 North 500 West [Photograph 44] whose more modest size and exterior reflect the loss of railroad traffic and post-World War I recession which occurred in Brigham City. There were a few examples of other styles, such as the Dutch Colonial Revival like the 1913 Bungalow at 413 South Main Street [Photograph 45].

In the second decade of the 20th Century, again following Utah trends, Period Revival style houses began to appear in Brigham City. There are only twenty-four (24) examples of Period Revivals constructed prior to 1921 in the *Brigham City Historic District*. An example is the English Tudor Period Revival located at 338 North 100 West [Photograph 46].

Commercial Architecture

Brigham City's commercial enterprises flourished between 1897 and 1920 and there are 34 commercial buildings which were constructed in this contextual period. Railroads were a source of goods and trade as well as passenger traffic, which facilitated more substantial businesses and

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hotels located in the Brigham City central business district, including some of Brigham City's most iconic commercial buildings. Hotels were constructed to house rail passengers, with the 1914 Hotel Brigham located at 9 West Forest Street (NRIS #91001543) [Photograph 48] and the 1915 Howard Hotel located at 33 South Main Street (NRIS #94001209) [Photograph 49] the two remaining examples. Entertainment and shopping establishments were also constructed, including the 1915 Period Revival styled Elberta Theater located at 53 South Main Street (NRIS #91001544) [Photograph 50], the 1907 Eddy Drug Store Building located at 14 South Main Street [Photograph 51] and the 1898 McMaster Building located at 96 South Main Street [Photograph 52]. Many of these commercial buildings have lost integrity as businesses have moved in and out in the ensuing century, an example of alterations to commercial buildings is the 1904 N. L. Hansen Variety Store Building located at 34 South Main Street [Photograph 53].

Architecture related to agriculture and agricultural production transportation are also extant from this contextual period. The 1898 Knudson Fruit Warehouse (817 West Forest Street) [Photograph 54] and the 1905 Jensen Brothers Flour Mill (733 West Forest Street) [Photograph 55], located near the 1906 Victorian Eclectic Oregon Short Line Railroad Passenger Terminal Building (833 West Forest Street) (NRIS #92000891) [Photograph 56] are examples of the influence of both rail and agriculture in Brigham City's commercial history.

Civic/Religious Architecture

There are five examples of civic or religious architecture from this contextual period, but like the commercial buildings above, these are among the most architecturally important buildings in the *Brigham City Historic District*. The civic buildings include the 1903 Brigham City Academy of Music and Dance located at 64 North Main [Photograph 57], the 1909 Brigham City Hall, which is now used as a fire station, located at 6 North Main Street (NRIS #88000389) [Photograph 58] and the 1915 Brigham City Prairie School Carnegie Library located at 26 East Forest Street (NRIS #84000143) [Photograph 59]. The single religious building constructed in this contextual period is the 1910 Romanesque Revival Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saint 3rd Ward Chapel located at 204 West 200 North [Photograph 60].

Agricultural Decline, Specialization and Bushnell General Hospital (1921-1946)

Although many Utah cities and towns saw a catastrophic loss of income and subsequently construction, Brigham City, with its sugar and flour mills, cement plant and later in the period fruit and vegetable canning companies, had steady residential and commercial construction throughout the 1920s and 1930s. As the United States contemplated wartime casualties, several military hospitals were envisioned, and Brigham City was selected as a prime location for a 1,500-bed hospital satellite site near Ogden Air Depot. City leaders donated 225 acres of land located east of Main Street and south of 700 South and the Bushnell General Hospital was constructed for nine million dollars and completed in October 1942. During the war, 13,000 soldiers were treated at Bushnell. The influx of construction workers and later hospital staff, specialized therapists and family members of long-term residents of Bushnell created a dire housing situation and led to another sustained period of growth and expansion in Brigham City.¹⁵

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There are 299 contributing and 109 non-contributing for a total 408 buildings as well as three contributing structures and one contributing site from the “Agricultural Decline, Specialization and Bushnell General Hospital” contextual period. Ninety-one (91) percent of the buildings are residential, with 369 single and 8 multiple dwellings.

Residential Architecture

As the influence of the railroad waned after the opening of the Lucin Cutoff in 1904 that made Ogden the primary Utah railroad connection, as well as the gradual loss of rail traffic north through Bear River Valley, Brigham City began to lag Utah residential architectural trends. Central-Block-with-Projecting-Bays (1885-1915), Foursquare (Box) (1900-1920), and Bungalows (1905-1920) continued as the dominant house styles constructed in Brigham City through the 1920s and even into the early 1930s with 89 extant examples.¹⁶ Many of these were substantial, large residences which echoed the steady economy in Brigham City throughout this period. Examples such as the 1927 Bungalow at 67 South 100 East [Photograph 61], 1929 Bungalow located at 321 North 100 West [Photograph 62], and 1926 Bungalow at 348 North 100 West. [Photograph 63]

Period Revival houses became more common in Brigham City, with 105 constructed between 1921 and 1940, also substantially later than most Utah cities and towns. The Period Revival styles found in Brigham City include Cape Cod and other Neo-Colonial Revivals such as the residence located at 10 South 200 East [Photograph 64], Clipped-Gable Cottages such as the 1934 residence at 163 North 300 West [Photograph 65], English Tudor Revivals like the 1937 example located at 137 South 200 East [Photograph 66], and Jacobethan Revivals such as the 1933 example at 80 North 100 East [Photograph 67].

As the United States prepared for World War II, Brigham City was selected as the site for the Bushnell General Hospital which was constructed in 1942. The construction and soon thereafter casualties, medical personnel, families and other support personnel that flooded into Brigham City created an initial housing crisis with residents allowing visitors to stay in their houses, then a housing construction boom. There were 164 World War II/Minimal Traditional cottages constructed in Brigham City, with 119 constructed between 1942 and 1946. Most of these residences were very similar in appearance and primarily constructed with striated-brick veneers, such as the 1946 residence at 519 South 200 East [Photograph 68] or wood/early aluminum siding such as the 1944 residence located at 520 South 100 West [Photograph 69]. A few large Minimal Traditional examples were constructed near the Bushnell General Hospital and are quite unusual for the Minimal Traditional style in Utah. An example is the residence located at 404 East 200 South [Photograph 70].

The wartime housing crisis in Brigham City spurred the construction of several multiple dwellings including the 1943 Bushnell Motel located at 115 East 700 South [Photograph 71] and the 1943 Art Deco residential building at 540 South 100 East [Photograph 72].

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Commercial Architecture

Brigham City's commercial construction was also steady during the 1920s before a construction boom that corresponded with the opening of the Bushnell General Hospital in the 1940s. There are 25 commercial buildings in Brigham City which were constructed between 1921 and 1946. Most of these buildings are 1-part block buildings housing department and specialty stores such as groceries and bakeries, an example of which is located at 140 North Main Street, constructed directly in front of an 1880s Victorian Cross Wing residence [Photograph 73]. Later businesses included service and gas stations such as the service station located at 25 South 600 West [Photograph 74]. Notable buildings include the 1929 Egyptian Revival Union Block building located at 57 South Main Street (NRIS #91001545) [Photograph 75] and the 1936 Cooley Memorial Hospital Building at 40 North 100 East [Photograph 76].

Civic/Religious Architecture

In Brigham City, like many other Utah cities and towns, the period after World War I and into the Great Depression was lean and there were few new municipal buildings constructed. Although the Bushnell General Hospital was constructed south of downtown Brigham City, all the wood-framed hospital buildings have since been demolished, leaving only a small cluster of administration buildings well away from other historic buildings in Brigham City. There are two remaining examples of civic building architecture, including the 1936 PWA Moderne War Memorial Building located at 126 E Forest Street [Photograph 77] and the Brigham City Utah Army National Guard Building.

Also constructed in this period were three structures: The Brigham City Archway Sign at 57 South Main Street [Photograph 78], the 1934 Box Elder Creek WPA Bridge and the front entry gate to Bushnell General Hospital at 380 East 700 South [Photograph 79] Rees Pioneer Park, a contributing site, was also designated during this contextual period.

Rees Pioneer Park [Photograph 112] is named for John D. Rees, second mayor of Brigham City (1875), who donated the land for the park and had trees planted along Forest Street. It was originally called Rees Park, but at the request of local Daughters of Utah Pioneers, the official name was later changed to Pioneer Park. Unofficially, though, the park has been referred to as "Rees Pioneer Park" through many generations. There are technically two parts: Rees Park (north of Forest Street) and Watkins Park (south of Forest Street). They were originally a swampy area which became a water reservoir and swimming pool before 1900. The south pond was deepened and stocked with fish, which continues today. Both parts of the park are mostly open, grassy areas with baseball/softball diamonds as well as a soccer pitch on the north end of the south section which is demarcated by grove of mature deciduous trees. In the north section, a public swimming pool is located at the southwest corner and the fish pond surrounded by mature deciduous trees at the southeast corner.

Two significant examples of LDS architecture were constructed in the mid-1920s, including the 1924 LDS 1st/9th Ward Chapel located at 236 East 100 South [Photograph 80] and the 1928 Frederick W. Hodgson designed Box Elder High School Seminary Building at 10 South 400 East [Photograph 81].

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Intermountain Indian School and Thiokol (1947-1974)

Brigham City suffered an unexpected economic setback when the Bushnell General Hospital closed in 1946. Town officials searched for a new tenant for the empty hospital property, which was filled in 1950 with the Intermountain Indian boarding school for Navajo students. The school helped Brigham City overcome the post-World War II loss of the hospital and generally depressed agricultural prices. Then in 1957, Thiokol Corporation opened its Minuteman ICBM missile motor facility at Promontory, west of Brigham City, providing a new large and stable employer for the city.

There are 436 contributing and 112 non-contributing for a total 548 buildings from this contextual period. Brigham City had most of its construction in this contextual period between 1949 and 1965. Of the 548 total resources, 432 were constructed between 1949 and 1965.

Residential Architecture

Under the influence of many new residents and explosive growth during World War II, Brigham City rapidly began to construct building types and styles in-line with regional and Utah state trends, which continued after the end of the war. There are only five late examples of Period Revival styles, including two Colonial Revivals, constructed in this period. An example of that late style, constructed in 1948 with a transitional form is located at 265 North 300 East [Photograph 84]. World War II/Minimal Traditional residences were very common in the early part of this contextual period, with 92 constructed. Two-thirds (61) were constructed with brick exteriors such as the 1948 residence located at 176 North 100 West [Photograph 85]. An example with clapboard siding is the 1949 residence located at 471 North 100 West [Photograph 86]. In the early 1950s, Ranch/Ramblers became the most common residence constructed in Brigham City, with 65 early ranches such as the 1962 residence with a unique roofline at 87 South 300 West [Photograph 87] and 213 Ranch/Rambler type residences. Examples of these include the 1955 residence with a carport located at 228 South 300 East [Photograph 88], the 1960 residence also with a carport at 555 South 300 East [Photograph 89], the 1965 Ranch with garage located at 224 North 300 West [Photograph 90], and the 1973 Ranch with garage located at 670 South 300 West [Photograph 91]. There are also 15 examples of Split-Level/Split-Entry residences within *Brigham City Historic District* boundaries, such as the 1961 Split-Level located at 330 West 200 North [Photograph 92] and 1970 Split-Entry located at 174 North 400 West [Photograph 93]. Much of the later construction in this contextual period occurred in new subdivisions outside the original plats and district boundaries as most of the lots had already been subdivided in earlier periods of growth.

Like earlier periods of strong growth, Brigham City also created 29 duplexes, 14 fourplexes, 2 eightplexes, and 2 mobile home parks within the district boundaries during this contextual period. Examples of the duplex form include the 1955 brick exterior duplex located at 215 West 400 South [Photograph 94] and the 1972 Ranch style duplex at 186 North 400 West [Photograph 95]. Brigham City has several types of fourplex multiple residences, including one- and two-story examples. An example is the 1962 fourplex located at 509 South 400 East [Photograph 96].

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Commercial Architecture

Sixty-two (62) commercial buildings were constructed in this contextual period, again focused between 1949 and 1965. The commercial construction in this period included infill on Main Street, new construction on blocks north and south of the early Main Street business district and on cross streets closely adjacent to Main Street. The businesses are a variety of small stores, business offices, service bay businesses, gas stations, restaurants, and department stores. The 1951 amusement hall at 550 South Main Street [Photograph 97] and the 1959 Brigham City cannery located at 506 North Main Street are notable for their size and bow-truss roofs [Photograph 98]. A representative example of a small grocery/department store is the 1950 1-Part Block Commercial Building located at 430 North Main Street [Photograph 99]; an example of a business office is the 1954 modern style building located at 118 East 100 North [Photograph 100]; the 1957 drive-in restaurant located at 306 North Main Street is a well-preserved early modern building [Photograph 101]; and a 1958 service-bay business example is located at 333 North Main Street [Photograph 102].

In addition to gas stations, drive-ins and other related businesses, the post-World War II expansion in car culture also expressed itself with the advent of motels. Brigham City has three motels constructed during this contextual period. An example is the 1958 motel located at 30 West 100 South [Photograph 103].

Civic/Religious Architecture

Brigham City has 7 government buildings which were constructed during this contextual period. Those include the 1970 Brigham City Office Building located at 20 North Main Street [Photograph 104], a post office and two schools, including the 1955 Protestant Student Center located at 435 East 700 South [Photograph 105].

Some of the most interesting buildings constructed during this contextual period were religious buildings constructed between 1953 and 1965, provided to serve Native American students from a variety of denominations, creating a highly unusual mid-century snapshot of U.S. religious architecture. There were eleven churches/meetinghouses and one LDS seminary building constructed in the *Brigham City Historic District* during this contextual period. Examples of religious architecture include the 1963 St. Michael's Episcopal Church at 589 South 200 East [Photograph 106], the 1964 modern Community Presbyterian Church Gillespie Hall located at 122 East 300 South [Photograph 107], the 1957 St. Henry's Church at 380 South 200 East [Photograph 82], and the First Baptist Church Chapel constructed circa 1955 at 634 South 400 East [Photograph 83].¹⁷

The *Brigham City Historic District*, located in Box Elder County, Utah includes 1807 buildings, 4 structures and 2 sites. The *Brigham City Historic District* has local significance under Criterion

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A in the area of Community Planning and Development for its unique presentation of the principles of the “Plat of the City of Zion.” Although the original plats of Brigham City mirror those of Salt Lake City’s early town and big field plats, Lorenzo Snow incorporated a unique neoclassical urban center plan with a central court house as well as rectangular blocks with moderate street widths not found in any other early LDS settled Utah city. The *Brigham City Historic District* has local significance under Criterion A in the area of Social History for its success as a primarily non-agricultural community, first with its Cooperative Mercantile Society, then with railroad transportation and later agricultural processing, military and educational facilities. Brigham City is one of only two LDS early “colony” towns who developed manufacturing economies rather than the common agrarian models found throughout the Intermountain West. Early LDS settlements, especially those far from established trade routes, were required by LDS President Brigham Young to be self-sustaining. Most Utah communities were located near water sources and were reliant on agriculture to provide for their citizens. Although Brigham City was also similarly sited, the lack of developable water sources available to expand agriculture led Lorenzo Snow to develop a manufacturing/industrial basis for Brigham City’s economy through his Cooperative Mercantile association. The railroad also allowed for non-agricultural trade and commerce into the 20th century when Utah began to move away from its subsistence agricultural roots and begin large-scale commercial farming.¹⁸ The *Brigham City Historic District* also has local significance under Criterion A in the area of Community Planning and Development for its residential density and early infill patterns. Brigham City, with its manufacturing- and trade-based economy, continued to grow within its urban core, with residential infill occurring through the middle of the 20th Century. Although initial lots were 132 feet wide, most lots have been subdivided, creating unique density for a small Utah city. The pattern of having the earliest residences located on street corners with alternating mid-19th Century, late Victorian and Late 19th and 20th Century American Movements residences within each block creates an unusual architectural feel to Brigham City. The *Brigham City Historic District* is significant at the local level under Criterion C for its architecture and the excellent physical representation of its four major periods of development. The *Brigham City Historic District* is significant under Criterion C for its well-preserved Classical, Late Victorian, Bungalow and World War II/Minimal Traditional residential, commercial and civic architecture.

The period of significance begins in 1855, four years after the initial settlement and one year after Brigham City was reinforced with settlers under the direction of Apostle Lorenzo Snow. The Christian Hansen House, located at 13 North 200 East and constructed in 1855 is the earliest extant contributing building resource in Brigham City¹⁹ [Photograph 15]. The period of significance ends in 1974 when major local employer Thiokol Corporation’s contract to produce Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missile motors ended after the construction of almost 1,000 solid fuel booster rockets. Although the Promontory facility began producing solid fuel booster

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rockets for the U.S. space shuttle program, that contract only produced 135 rocket motors over the program's life span between 1975-2011. The historic and architectural resources of the district are eligible within four historical themes "Reinforcement, Brigham City Cooperative Society, and Founding of Brigham City" (1855-1896), "Utah Sugar Company, Community Development and Prosperity" (1897-1920), "Agricultural Decline, Specialization and Bushnell General Hospital" (1921-1946), and "Intermountain Indian School and Thiokol" (1947-1974). . The district is also being nominated under the Historic Resources of Brigham City multiple property submission "The Co-op: The Brigham City Mercantile and Manufacturing Association, 1864-1895" and "Private Commercial and Industrial Development, 1880s-1930s" contexts.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

Criterion A Significance: Community Planning and Development

The *Brigham City Historic District* has local significance under Criterion A in the area of Community Planning and Development for its unique presentation of the principles of the "Plat of the City of Zion" as well as for its residential density and early infill patterns.

After his appointment as the settlement's ecclesiastic and civic leader in the fall of 1853, Lorenzo Snow, with his family, arrived in then named Box Elder in the spring of 1854 and began to immediately transform the primitive settlement into his vision of a civilized city. In 1854, Lorenzo Snow directed a resurvey of the original townsite and re-sited it on level ground near Box Elder Creek where a network of canals and ditches were created to provide water. Lorenzo Snow soon renamed the settlement to Brigham City, in honor of LDS Church President Brigham Young.²⁰ The original three plats of Brigham City mirror those of Salt Lake City's early town and big field plats, which were designed by Brigham Young following general principles of LDS Church founder Joseph Smith's original "Plat of the City of Zion." Brigham City's design included a symmetrical gridiron street pattern aligned in cardinal directions, a central townsite with low-density half-acre lots for houses, surrounding larger (1 and 1.23 acre) lots for barns and corrals, two larger blocks in the town center specifically for civic and religious buildings, adjoining central blocks for civic and religious buildings and uniform 25' setbacks for houses.

Although Brigham City's design closely follows Brigham Young's, Oberlin College-educated Lorenzo Snow altered the design to encompass three unusual elements: The neoclassical urban center plan which appears to be based on William Penn's 1683 grid design of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; construction of a central court house in the city center, blocking roads; and the design of a town plat that had rectangular, not square blocks, with moderate street widths.²¹ In 1856, Lorenzo Snow directed the construction of the Box Elder County court house [Photograph 1] as a multi-purpose building serving as government offices, an auditorium for church services

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and public meetings and as a theater. Completed in 1857, the original courthouse still forms the rear main section of the current Box Elder County building.²² Lorenzo Snow chose the exact center of the settlement to erect the building, directly facing Forest Street, the central east-west boulevard connecting the railroad passenger station and downtown, a road which he expanded in width. The courthouse blocks Forest Street at Main Street, disrupting the uniform grid pattern typically envisioned in the Plat of Zion. Unlike other contemporary Utah towns, the 1876 tabernacle, designed for large religious gatherings, was constructed 2½ blocks south of the city center [Photograph 29], rather than one of the designated larger central blocks. Brigham City also has rectangular blocks with moderate street widths, which again bear a closer resemblance to the Philadelphia plan than the 660-foot square blocks and 132-foot-wide streets typically found in other Utah cities and towns. Brigham City's blocks are 6 acres, smaller than the 10-acre blocks found in Salt Lake City's early plats. Town lots were initially 165 feet deep by 132 feet wide 1/2-acre lots with blocks containing 5 or 6 lots in length and 2 lots deep. Streets running north and south were initially 99 feet wide and those running east and west were 66 feet wide. Those initial design widths have been reduced by the addition of wide park strips and sidewalks to a uniform 60-foot paved street width, except for Forest Street, which is 132 feet wide west of the courthouse. See Figure 1 for early town plats and design.

The *Brigham City Historic District* also has local significance under Criterion A in the area of Community Planning and Development for its residential density and early infill patterns. Brigham City began with large 1/2 acre lots, in keeping with the "City of the Plat of Zion" layout, but with its manufacturing economy and growth periods primarily occurring before the advent of large-scale automobile travel, the city generally subdivided each lot into two, creating a denser, more walkable residential design pattern than most early Utah towns. Infill is a defining element in Brigham City and residential designs from each of the periods of early prosperity can be found next to one another as the city developed, with the oldest classical/mid-19th Century Revival residences on the corners of town blocks. Late Victorian residential buildings are also often present on or near block corners and Bungalows are interspersed between earlier residential buildings. [Photographs 3, 4, and 5] Toward the edges of town, the infill becomes World War II/Minimal Traditional style as the Bushnell General Hospital created a last large boom within the traditional residential section of Brigham City.

Brigham City, with its manufacturing- and trade-based economy, is unique for its continued growth within its urban core, with residential infill occurring through the middle of the 20th Century. LDS President Brigham Young directed the settlement of towns throughout Utah and the Intermountain West to ensure LDS dominance in the region. These early settlements commonly created a central town plat with surrounding larger lots for corrals and barns and remote fields. Settlers were directed to live in the town plats and travel to their livestock and fields. The model was followed in early settlements, although corrals and barns were commonly moved to town lots. By 1880, with the end of most Native American and federal troop threats, residents began to build residences on their farm parcels and "colony" towns rarely experienced growth after 1880 through the end of the 19th Century, and often beyond.²³

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Criterion A Significance: Social History

The *Brigham City Historic District* has local significance under Criterion A in the area of Social History for its success as a primarily non-agricultural based community. Brigham City is one of only two LDS early “colony” towns who developed manufacturing economies rather than the common agrarian models found throughout the Intermountain West. Parowan in Iron County, also without extensive water supplies, developed several successful manufacturing industries, but without a direct link to rail transportation faltered after 1890.²⁴ Brigham City is the only example that succeeded with an industrial/trade economy throughout the 19th century and early 20th century. Faced with the lack of available water to create an agrarian economy, especially after a large influx of Scandinavian immigrants in 1864, Lorenzo Snow determined to construct a manufacturing/industrial economy to support the residents of Brigham City. He created the Brigham City Mercantile Cooperative Society. The cooperative had 40 departments at its zenith, including a woolen mill, flouring mill, cabinet mill, three sawmills, a lime kiln, extensive sheep and cattle herds located in far-flung grazing lands, a dairy, cotton-growing acreage in Southern Utah, among several other enterprises. In 1868-69, the Transcontinental Railroad and in 1871, Utah Northern Railroad construction created more urban labor jobs and continuing rail traffic allowed for a specialized trade and travel economy in Brigham City [Photographs 49, 50, 51, 54, 56]. In 1901, just as the railroad era was ending, the Utah Sugar Company, owned by the LDS Church, facilitated the construction of an extensive system of canals extending from the Bear River north of Brigham City through the area directly west of the city, allowing for large-scale farming and the construction of several agricultural processing facilities in Brigham City [Photographs 55 and 98]. The 1930s Great Depression severely impacted Utah agriculture, but Brigham City continued with its other than agricultural economic basis with the construction of Bushnell General Hospital, its later conversion to the Intermountain Indian School and in 1957 the opening of Thiokol’s Promontory rocket motor test and construction facility, which produced 1,000 Minuteman ICBM solid fuel booster rockets before the contract ended in 1974. These industries provided employment to Brigham City’s population through 1974. Brigham City’s unique social history created a residential and commercial density in Brigham City, unlike other Utah cities and towns.

Criterion C Significance: Architecture

The *Brigham City Historic District* is significant under Criterion C at the local level for its excellent and well-preserved Classical, Late Victorian, Bungalow and World War II/Minimal Traditional residential, commercial and civic architectural resources. With 61% of its 1,813 properties retaining historical integrity, the range of architectural types and styles reflect well the historic district’s remote “colony” town beginning, early exposure to national Victorian and American Movements trends as an early major Utah railroad construction and transportation hub, and extensive mid-century construction related to the World War II Bushnell General Hospital, Intermountain Indian School and Thiokol.

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The historical and architectural significance of the district are discussed in more detail below in the context of the four major development periods that shaped the district and comprise its period of significance. The district is also being nominated as part of the *Historic Resources of Brigham City* multiple property submission, under the “The Co-op: The Brigham City Mercantile and Manufacturing Association, 1864-1895” and “Private Commercial and Industrial Development, 1880s-1930s” contexts. “The Co-op: The Brigham City Mercantile and Manufacturing Association, 1864-1895” corresponds to the “Reinforcement, Brigham City Cooperative Society, and Founding of Brigham City (1855-1896) context in this nomination. The “Private Commercial and Industrial Development, 1880s-1930s” context encompasses the commercial resources sections of the first three historical and architectural contexts in this nomination: “Reinforcement, Brigham City Cooperative Society, and Founding of Brigham City” (1855-1896), “Utah Sugar Company, Community Development and Prosperity” (1897-1920), and “Agricultural Decline, Specialization and Bushnell General Hospital” (1921-1946).

Historical and Architectural Context

Reinforcement, Brigham City Cooperative Society, and Founding of Brigham City (1855-1896)

Under Criterion A during this contextual period, the significant themes for the district are Community Planning and Development and Social History. Brigham City’s 1854 townsite design, including lots, blocks and streets were designed and implemented during this period. Under Criterion C during this contextual period, the area of significance of Architecture manifests itself with early Classical and Late Victorian residential buildings [Photographs 11-26] and some of the most significant civic and commercial buildings constructed in Brigham City including the Box Elder County Courthouse [Photograph 1], Box Elder Stake Tabernacle [Photograph 29], Brigham City First Ward Building [Photograph 30] and LDS Relief Society Granary [Photograph 10].

Reinforcement

In the October 1853 General Conference of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS), Church President Brigham Young called one of his most senior advisors and member of the Council of Twelve Apostles, Lorenzo Snow, to lead 50 families to strengthen the settlement at Box Elder and make it self-sufficient. According to Leonard Arrington’s 1965 *Utah Historical Quarterly* article “Cooperative Community in the North: Brigham City, Utah” care was used to select settlers with skills such as schoolteachers, masons, carpenters, blacksmiths and other skilled craftsmen to ensure the economic success of the community. The group was specifically instructed by Brigham Young to grow and manufacture all that they consumed.²⁵ In 1854, the group of settlers led by Lorenzo Snow permanently moved to the settlement they renamed to Brigham (later Brigham City) in honor of Church President Brigham Young. Under the direction of Lorenzo Snow, Brigham City was re-sited and platted by prominent Utah surveyor Jesse W.

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Fox, and in 1855 residents began constructing their homes on the new town lots.²⁶ By 1864, Lorenzo Snow had overseen the construction of a fort, canal, gristmill and sawmill for the isolated settlement. Key to the further development of Brigham City, Lorenzo Snow consulted Jesse W. Fox on the possibility of increasing the available water supply to Brigham City through the diversion of the Bear River. Although Fox identified that it would be possible given enough capital, it would take almost 50 years to complete the project, leaving Brigham City with some of the most limited water supplies available to any early LDS settlement.²⁷

Brigham City Cooperative Mercantile Society

Following a large influx of Scandinavian immigrants in 1864, the town of Brigham City numbered almost 1,600 residents and was still geographically and physically isolated from the outside world, preventing the development of a specialized economy in addition to the lack of additional water available to cultivate increased farming acreage to support those new residents.²⁸ Lorenzo Snow, to further Brigham Young's vision of self-sufficiency, organized a cooperative general store and later the Brigham City Co-operative Mercantile Association. According to Leonard Arrington's research, including Lorenzo Snow's correspondence with Brigham Young on the topic and other primary materials, Arrington concluded that "It was his intention to use this mercantile cooperative as the basis for the organization of the entire economic life of the community and the development of the industries needed to make the community self-sufficient."²⁹ The first industrial investment was a two-story tannery, which later expanded into a boot and shoe shop and saddle and harness shop employing 30 people. The businesses exported goods to larger markets in Salt Lake City, Ogden and Logan. The enterprises were incorporated in 1870 as the "Brigham City Mercantile and Manufacturing Company" and were expanded to include a woolen factory with extensive sheep herds on farms near Bear River City, Utah. At its largest, the co-operative society had 40 departments and 500 employees. Those enterprises included a dairy, farm machinery factory, horticultural nurseries, several types of mills, including molasses, shingle, lath and picket mills. Three sawmills, including a large steam sawmill were located in Marsh Valley, Idaho. Co-operative operated farms throughout Box Elder County, cotton and sugar cane farms 300 miles away in southern Utah, and flax farms in Mantua, Utah. Construction enterprises included brick and adobe shops, a lime kiln, blacksmith shops, furniture and cabinet shops, and a two-story factory which produced turned, planed and worked wood moldings. The co-operative also featured a public works department which built roads, bridges, dams, canals and public buildings. The cooperative completely supported the 400 families residing in Brigham City with wages in the form of scrip, goods and services. In 1874, President Brigham Young, using Brigham City as an example, called other cities and towns to organize shared collective "United Orders" throughout Utah to promote self-sufficiency and autonomy for members of the LDS church.³⁰

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In 1877, a fire at the Brigham City woolen mill destroyed the factory and equipment completely. Also in 1877, the co-operative sawmill at Marsh Valley, Idaho was raided by federal agents and its employees imprisoned, causing the forced sale of the equipment and land and the loss of revenue from a large contract with the Utah & Northern Railroad. In 1878, the U.S. Internal Revenue Service assessed the co-operative \$10,200 in a tax revenue dispute. These setbacks caused the cooperative to eventually to close or sell off all its departments, and by 1880 the only remnant was the general store. In 1885, Lorenzo Snow was indicted on a charge of unlawful cohabitation and served 11 months in the Utah Penitentiary, among other community and ecclesiastical leaders. A long depression in the 1890s was the final blow to the Brigham City Co-operative store, which went bankrupt in 1895. The association charter expired in 1896 and the cooperative store building located at 11 North Main Street [Photograph 47] was taken over by the Deseret Savings Bank, ending Brigham City's remarkable and highly successful experiment with co-operative commercial and social enterprise.³¹

Founding of Brigham City

In 1856, the Utah Territorial Legislature created Box Elder County by partitioning part of Weber County to the south. Although not formally incorporated until January of 1867, the town of Brigham City immediately began to organize municipal services. One of the first public structures constructed was the Box Elder County Courthouse located at 1 North Main Street [Photograph 1], started in 1856. Although the building has been remodeled several times, including the clock tower in 1887 and Andrew Funk designed Neo-Classical temple front façade in 1910, the building rear remains the first civic building constructed in Brigham City.³² The city of Brigham City was formally incorporated on January 12, 1867 and that same month, the Utah Territorial Legislature authorized municipal elections.

The Transcontinental Railroad and the Utah Northern Railroad

The Railroad Act of 1862 placed U.S. Government support behind a transcontinental railroad, helped to create the Union Pacific Railroad company and identified the route just south of Brigham City, Utah through Weber Canyon and around the northern end of the Great Salt Lake, just a few miles west of Brigham City.³³ That route guaranteed that railroad construction and increased communication after the completion of the railroad would upend the insular social and economic lives of both the residents of Brigham City and more generally all of Utah. As construction progressed through Utah in 1868 and 1869, Brigham City and Ogden were the closest cities to the routes and grew to support the thousands of railroad workers who constructed roads, rails and bridges. The economic boom was magnified by the thousands of local men who were also hired to work on the grading through Weber Canyon and hauling of freight, bringing a cash economy to Northern Utah for the first time.³⁴ Brigham City was affected by the

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construction for only a few years, but during those years it boomed as a place for travelers and executives to stay as they supervised construction. Nearby non-LDS Corinne, Utah became a large railroad center for several years, and competed with Brigham City for pre-eminence in Box Elder County.³⁵

A second rail project, with a much larger and sustained impact on Brigham City was the Utah Northern Railroad, an extension of the 1869 Utah Central Railroad constructed between Ogden and Salt Lake City by the LDS Church to connect with the Transcontinental Railroad. The Utah Northern Railroad was conceived by John W. Young, a son of LDS President Brigham Young, who envisioned a railroad stretching northward from Ogden through Brigham City and Cache Valley to the lucrative mining markets of Idaho and Montana.³⁶ Ground was broken at Brigham City on August 26, 1871 and the narrow-gauge rail line from Brigham City to Hampton's Station in Cache Valley was completed in 1872. Connections to the Union Pacific Railroad at Corinne in 1873 and Ogden 1874 completed the southern end of the rail line.³⁷ Brigham City residences constructed during this period reflect an early trend away from Classical to Late Victorian forms and styles [Photographs 19, 21, 23, 24, 25 and 26]. A second line from Brigham City bypassed Cache Valley, following the Bear River, Downey and Snake River valleys to Montana, which was later reorganized as the Oregon Short Line Railroad.³⁸ The rail station at Brigham City allowed for both goods and information to freely circulate to and from Brigham City, changing the economy and built environment and continuing Brigham City's industrial economy. The railroad facilitated the almost doubling of Brigham City's population from 1,877 in 1870 to 2,859 in 1900.

Utah Sugar Company, Community Development and Prosperity (1897-1920)

Under Criterion A during this contextual period, the significant themes for the district are Community Planning and Development and Social History, including the continuation of a manufacturing and trade economy and continued urban infill in Brigham City. Under Criterion C during this contextual period, the area of significance of Architecture manifests itself with continued construction of Late Victorian residential buildings primarily in later Central-Block-with-Projecting Bays and Rectangular Block forms [Photographs 32-40], extensive and varied Bungalow and Foursquare (Box) forms [Photographs 41-45] and early Period Revival styles [Photograph 46]. Many commercial buildings were also constructed in this contextual period which demonstrate the twin economic bases of Brigham City: rail transportation and large-scale agricultural production [Photographs 47-55]. The Oregon Short Line Railroad station [Photograph 56] is one of the most architecturally unique buildings in Brigham City. Civic construction in this contextual period includes the 1909 Brigham City Hall [Photograph 58], the 1915 Carnegie Library Building [Photograph 59] and the LDS 3rd Ward Building [Photograph 60].

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Bear River Valley Canal

The original 1862 U.S. Government Pacific Railroad Act land grant to the Central Pacific Railroad Company extended through central Bear River Valley was sold to Alexander Toponce and William Kerr of the Corinne Mill, Canal and Stock Company in the early 1870s.³⁹ Toponce and Kerr created a plan for a dam in Bear River Canyon to provide irrigation water through the Bear River Valley, but were unable to complete the project. In 1889, irrigation promoter John Bothwell and the Jarvis and Conklin Mortgage Trust Company incorporated the Bear Lake and River Water Works and Irrigation Company with the land and water assets of the Corinne Mill, Canal and Stock Company. Construction had already begun in 1888 and was substantially completed in 1892, with most of the actual construction completed by one of the chief contractors, William Garland.⁴⁰ Although the initial canal company failed and work slowed in the early 1890s, by the late 1890s, the Central Canal was extended past Garland through Tremonton and to Brigham City. Like almost all western U.S. commercial reclamation project companies, the Bear Lake and River Water Works and Irrigation Company failed in 1894. After years of litigation, the canal was finally awarded to William Garland for a construction lien, and in 1901 it was sold to the Utah Sugar Company and operated as the Bear River Water Company.⁴¹ ⁴² The canal substantially increased the amount and reliability of water supplies to Brigham City and surrounding farmers.

Utah Sugar Company

Another development that substantially changed the future of Brigham City was the organization of the Utah Sugar Company in 1891 and the establishment of the Utah Sugar Company sugar beet processing plant at Garland, Utah just north of Tremonton, Box Elder County, Utah in 1901. The Utah Sugar Company, which later became the Utah-Idaho Sugar Company, was part of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints effort for self-sufficiency prior to statehood. The Utah Sugar Company purchased the Bear River Canal system and lands still owned by the development company. In addition to expanding the canal network, the Utah Sugar Company also completed a pumping station which took water from the west side canal which supported a 2,700-horsepower plant and provided power for the pumps and for the Garland Sugar Company beet processing plant under development, among other locations. Additionally, the company constructed a branch rail line connecting the Garland area with the Union Pacific line at Corinne, directly through Tremonton, with a connection at Brigham City. Construction started on the beet processing plant in 1901 and it became operational in 1903. Although it was a seasonal

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operation, the plant operated until 1966, providing a long-term and stable purchaser of agricultural produce from local Box Elder County farms.

In *The Awkward State of Utah: Coming of Age in the Nation 1896-1945*, authors Charles S. Peterson and Brian Q. Cannon describe the stability and prosperity found in the Bear River Valley:

Utah Sugar Company's interest turned to the Bear River Valley as a region with unrealized potential. In a classic example of the difficulties private finance encountered in reclamation, corporate efforts to develop Bear River irrigation had bogged down into ever-deepening troubles, as a succession of local, national, and international promotions and engineering and organization maneuvers failed. When Bear River beet experiments succeeded, the Utah Sugar Company was able to break the legal and financial impasse in 1901. With its church connection and promise of a cash crop, it provided "the right catalyst for the valley's development."

In a wonder of water, land, markets, and homemakers, the most stable and lasting agricultural development of the era took place, enabling Box Elder County to rank with Cache as one of the state's premier farm counties. Utah Sugar soon extended the east-side canal as far south as Brigham City, established a power plant in it, and persuaded the Oregon Short Line Railroad to build a branch to what became Garland. Pushing hard, E.H. Dyer completed the Garland factory for the 1903 campaign. By 1906 eighty-four thousand tons of beets were grown, and 207,000 one-hundred pound bags of sugar were produced.⁴³

Brigham City and surrounding areas produced enough sugar beets to justify the construction of a second beet processing plant in Brigham City, which opened in 1916. The factory initially processed 500 tons of beets, which increased to 900 tons by the early 1920s. The success of the farmers and factory created a second sustained economic boom period for Brigham City lasting from 1900-1929, although beet curly-top disease curtailed operations after 1923. The Brigham City Factory operated from 1916 through 1929, with two additional seasons in 1933 and 1937. The factory closed in 1937 and was dismantled in 1943.⁴⁴

Community Development

In 1898, Lorenzo Snow left Brigham City, the place he had influenced and led for the past four decades to become the fifth President of the Church Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Snow only served for three years before his death in 1901, but with his death, Brigham City lost its most prominent resident and supporter. In 1904, the 102-mile Lucin railroad cut-off was completed, connecting Ogden with the small town of Lucin on the west side of the Great Salt Lake over thirteen miles of fill and nearly twelve miles of trestle bridges. Unfortunately for Brigham City, the new route caused the Promontory line to become a branch line and trains declined from three

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trains a week to only one and only through political pressure was the rail line kept in service at all.⁴⁵ In spite of these challenges, Brigham City prospered as a town and Box Elder County seat. The city and its residents established roads, schools and entertainment and had a vibrant downtown commercial district. Construction between 1900 and 1920 included the Box Elder Academy of Music and Dance in 1903 [Photograph 57], seventeen commercial buildings [Photographs 51-54], two large hotels [Photographs 48-49] and a theater [Photograph 50].⁴⁶ In 1907, the Ogden and Northwestern Railroad was extended to Brigham City and in 1915, the Utah-Idaho Interurban Electric Railway Line was also extended 19.5 miles from Ogden to Brigham City and operated until 1919 when buses replaced rail service.⁴⁷ Brigham City's population expanded from 2,859 in 1900 to 5,282 in 1920.

Agricultural Decline, Specialization and Bushnell General Hospital (1921-1946)

Under Criterion A during this contextual period, the significant themes for the district again are Community Planning and Development and Social History. Under Criterion C during this contextual period, the area of significance of Architecture manifests itself with late Bungalow, Period Revivals and World War II/Minimal Traditional residential construction [Photographs 61-70] as well as unusual for such as small community multiple housing including motels [Photograph 71], apartment buildings [Photograph 72], fourplexes and duplexes. Commercial construction and civic construction reflected national Period Revival [Photographs 75-76, 80], WPA Moderne [Photographs 77-78] and Prairie School [Photograph 81] trends.

Agricultural Decline

After World War I ended in 1918, the economies of Box Elder County and Utah as a whole began to experience uneven prosperity. Urban and rural economies diverged significantly, with cities and towns flourishing through the end of the 1920s and rural economies struggling with low commodity prices and small farm acreage.⁴⁸ The rise of automobile transportation and the decline of railroad passenger operations also led to a decline in the amount of traffic and profits of the businesses in Brigham City. Although the beet processing plant operation held off the decline for a few years, by the latter part of the 1920s, Brigham City began to experience the stagnation that affected many rural Utah towns, which was exacerbated by the Great Depression between 1930 and 1940. The population of Brigham City was essentially flat from 1920 through 1940, with a decline of 200 residents from 1930. In the 1940 census, Brigham City numbered 5,641 residents.

Specialization

As Utah matured into statehood in the late 1890s, the rapid access to markets caused major changes to agriculture throughout the state. Subsistence crops were replaced with specialty crops

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which were sold throughout the region and nation via the railroad and later trucks. One of the earliest trends was the orchard boom which occurred in Utah in the two decades surrounding 1900. State agricultural inspectors had sprayed and destroyed thousands of infected and blighted trees, creating the conditions for a resurgence in production.⁴⁹ Peaches had been grown in Brigham City since at least 1855 according to local histories, with the first planted by William Wrighton, one of the settlers accompanying Lorenzo Snow.⁵⁰ In 1904, Brigham City held its first "Peach Day" celebration in September to both celebrate the harvest, but to also attract settlers and investors to the county.⁵¹ Large orchards and the Brigham City Peach Days celebration continues to the present day. In addition to orchards, peas, celery, strawberries and other specialty crops were grown on the irrigated farms surrounding Brigham City through the end of World War II, although the Great Depression reduced the ability to sell the crops for cash.

Bushnell General Hospital

In the 1930s, the United States as a growing world power began reacting to the growing threat of German and Japanese military aggression through a program of defense manufacturing and storage facilities. The Intermountain West and more specifically Ogden, Utah was favored because it was geographically protected from land and air invasions on both coasts, as well as having good railroad and transportation connections. In 1935, Congress passed the Wilcox-Wilson Act which authorized the secretary of war to determine the location of permanent Air Corps stations, one of which was to be in the Rocky Mountain area. After visits and studies, a site south of Ogden, Utah was selected and the Works Progress Administration began construction of temporary facilities in 1938 and the base opened as Hill Field in 1940. Ogden was also the site of an earlier arsenal which was constructed in the 1920s.⁵² Ogden Air Depot (Hill Field) became the largest wartime employer of civilians in Utah during World War II with 6,000 military employees and 15,780 civilian workers.⁵³ As the United States contemplated wartime casualties, several military hospitals were envisioned, and Brigham City was selected as a prime location for a 1,500-bed hospital as a satellite site near Ogden Air Depot. City leaders donated 225 acres of land located east of Main Street and south of 700 South and the Bushnell General Hospital was constructed for nine million dollars in October 1942 [Photograph 79]. During the war, 13,000 soldiers were treated at Bushnell. The influx of construction workers and later hospital staff, specialized therapists and family members of long-term residents of Bushnell created a dire housing situation and led to another sustained period of growth and expansion in Brigham City.⁵⁴ Bushnell was designated as a regional hospital for soldiers from Utah, Idaho, Montana, Nevada and Arizona and it was common for families to visit and even live in Brigham City while their relatives were in hospital. In 1946, soon after the end of the war, Bushnell General Hospital was permanently closed, ending this contextual period. Although Brigham

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City's population only officially grew to 6,790 in the 1950 census, during World War II there were many more residents and visitors.

Intermountain Indian School and Thiokol (1947-1974)

Under Criterion A during this contextual period, the significant themes for the district again are Community Planning and Development and Social History. Under Criterion C during this contextual period, the area of significance of Architecture manifests with late World War II/Minimal Traditional residential construction as well as a unique collection of mid-century religious buildings. Brigham City suffered a serious economic setback when the Bushnell General Hospital closed in 1946. Town officials searched for a new tenant for the empty hospital property, which was filled in 1950 with the Intermountain Indian boarding school for Navajo students. The school helped Brigham City overcome its post-World War II loss of its primary economic driver. Also, in 1957, Thiokol Corporation opened its Minuteman missile motor facility at Promontory, west of Brigham City, providing another large and stable employer for the city. Correspondingly, Brigham City had most of its construction in this contextual period between 1949 and 1965. Under Criterion C during this contextual period, the area of significance of Architecture manifests itself with late World War II/Minimal Traditional and early Ranch/Rambler residential construction. Commercial and civic development continued, primarily smaller minimal traditional or modern styled buildings [Photographs 99-105] In this contextual period, Brigham City constructed its unusual collection of mid-century religious buildings [Photographs 82-83, 106-107].

Intermountain Indian School

After the closure of Bushnell General Hospital, leaders in Brigham City looked for a use for the abandoned hospital buildings. In 1950, the hospital was converted into a boarding school for Navajo student vocational training and named the Intermountain Indian School. In the 1970s, renamed the "Intermountain Intertribal School" the school began to host students from many different tribes, with a rise in tensions between students. At the same time, the practice of removing Native American students from their homes began to be perceived as negative through the sustained efforts of tribal leaders. The school permanently closed in 1984. Although there have been some temporary uses of the buildings over the past 40 years, no sustained use was found and the buildings were demolished in 2013 for the construction of a new Utah State University Brigham City regional campus.⁵⁵

Thiokol Corporation and Solid Fuel Rocket Motors

During the postwar years, Brigham City's economy diversified again and became more dependent on larger commercial enterprises, particularly with the Thiokol Corporation locating a solid fuel rocket motor plant west and north of Brigham City at Promontory, Utah. The plant commenced operations in 1957. The initial contract for Minuteman ICBM system motors lasted several years, and produced 1,000 booster rockets. That contract was followed in 1974 by a

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smaller contract to provide solid fuel rocket motors for the U.S. Space Shuttle program, which produced only 135 boosters over its lifespan and ended in 2011.⁵⁶ Thiokol provided stability and jobs for local residents and led to the city growing to 15,596 residents in the 1980 census. By 1978, Thiokol was the primary source of income for 44% of the workers in Box Elder County.⁵⁷ The changes brought specialized workers and engineers and led to the construction of many of the residences on the north side of Brigham City, including rare Utah examples of Modern residential architecture, as well as many 1950s style ranch style houses [Photographs 84-94] and continued the trend of multiple housing development in Brigham City [Photographs 94-96]. That growth helped the city weather the decline of agriculture and the closure of the Garland Sugar Beet plant in 1966.

Verbal Boundary Description (Describe the boundaries of the property.)

The south boundary extends along 700 South from 300 West to 500 East, including both sides of those streets, as well as the original gates of Bushnell General Hospital on the south side of 700 South. The east boundary extends from 700 South just behind 500 East to 500 South, then extends eastward to 600 East to encompass the Brigham City Cemetery boundary between 500 South and 300 South, then continues behind 500 East to 100 North. At 100 North, the boundary follows Box Elder Creek and Box Elder Canal northeasterly to 400 North and 100 East. Specifically, the boundary moves northwesterly between 500 East and 400 East between 200 and 300 North; then west along 200 North to 300 East; then north to 300 North; then west again just behind 300 North to 100 East; then north to 500 North. The northern boundary extends west from 100 East to 300 West just behind 500 North. The western boundary extends south from 500 North just behind 300 West, to 300 North; then west to 500 West along both sides of 300 North Street; then south just behind 500 West to Forest Street; then west including both sides of Forest Street to 850 West; then south along 500 West to 200 South; east including both sides of 200 South to 400 West; then south to 300 South including both sides of 400 West; then east along 300 South to 300 West; then south just behind 300 West to 700 South. See Figure 1 and Map 1 for construction dates, Brigham City Plats and district boundary detail.

Boundary Justification (Explain why the boundaries were selected.)

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The boundaries of the *Brigham City Historic District* are approximately the general extent of 19th century residential and pre-1950 commercial and residential construction density within the original three plats of Brigham City. 






