2025 RURAL REVIVE & RESIDE (PAUL BRUHN SUBGRANTS) PUBLIC NOTICE

The communities and property owners listed below have received grants for the following projects through the federal Historic Preservation Fund, administered by the Utah State Historic Preservation Office. This notice serves to make the public aware of the projects and solicit comments pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act. The National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 authorizes a program of federal matching grants, known as the Historic Preservation Fund, to assist the various states in carrying out historic preservation activities. The Program is sponsored by the U.S. Department of the Interior, National Park Service, and in Utah, the Utah State Historic Preservation Office.

Mount Pleasant — GO Insurance and Financial Services, LLC

Funding amount: **\$49,713.11**

Project summary: Rehabilitation work on the National Register-listed 40 West Main building in historic downtown Mount Pleasant.

Brigham City — Union Block, LLC

Funding amount: **\$43,639.96**

Project summary: Rehabilitation work on the National Register-listed Union Block Building.

Brigham City — Tory Rollins and others

Funding amount: **\$50,000**

Project summary: Rehabilitation work on the National Register-listed Horsley Building.

Mount Pleasant City Redevelopment Agency

Funding amount: **\$50,000**

Project summary: Rehabilitation work on the National Register-listed Seely-Hinckley Building.

This work is funded by the National Park Service's Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization Grant. The grants are paid for by the Historic Preservation Fund, which uses revenue from federal offshore oil and gas leases to support a broad range of preservation projects without spending tax dollars.
